Neighbor Profile: Melinda Frame: Brainstorming about Community

Melinda Frame is a native Burqueña who, like many others, left New Mexico and then returned to live in our beloved city. She has been community-minded her entire life, finding her best energy through her connections with friends and neighbors. Melinda has lived in Parkland Hills for 13 years. It wasn't her first choice of 'hoods. Originally, she was hoping to buy in the North Valley where she was in a contract for a property that she hoped would be her own "little oasis". When that purchase didn't work out, she wound up buying a house here, not realizing that, in fact, she'd found a different kind of oasis, one where instead of growing crops, she'd be growing connections. Instead of raising goats, she'd be out running around with other avid dog walkers.

Melinda notes that it is the walkability of our neighborhood that makes it so neighborly. People being in their yards, walking in the neighborhood, and getting to know each other helps all of us. She thinks that watching out for one another is how we can all stay safer and feel better too. Melinda has been active in the Parkland Hills Neighborhood Association for many years, most recently chairing the Homelessness Solutions Committee, an ad hoc group that started in response to the City's plans to develop the Gateway Center east of San Mateo on Gibson. Her group has grown to around 10 members. They have been actively communicating with the city to bring neighborhood concerns about public safety forward. It is challenging work that can be fraught with frustration, yet, as Melinda notes, neighborhood input is essential so that the Gateway and other such projects can be well-designed, effective, and sustainable.

If Melinda's community involvement has taught her anything, it's that the real energy we all need comes directly from our connections to one another. She notes that the isolation brought about by Covid is only a symptom of a larger societal malaise that grew, at least in part, out of too much screen time. Melinda believes we can all benefit from more face-to-face time. She looks forward to working with our Village to help all our neighbors grow their connections to one another.
